Fragments of an Archive consists of 9 videos featuring poetry readings, documentary footage, digital animations, field recordings and photos from the artistic «archives» which were produced during the formation of the exhibitions, *A Season in Shell* (Zurich, 2014), *Mutual Aid* (Zurich, 2016) and a performance in the framework of *New York post-et préfiguratif* (NYC, 2015). The exhibitions and performance looked at transnational trade flows of objects and ideas between Africa, China and Switzerland.


